Our visitors were Gemma who is a coordinator for the GDA, Janet who is looking after a mischievous 6 months old lab cross retriever called Digger until he is ready for formal training, and Jo and her working guide dog, Jess.

Each gave great insight into their job description.

Gemma's chief role is to support fundraising which must be a very busy role given the full cost of training a lab to full working age is about £55 000 pounds.

Janet must have the patience of a saint because she has to look after Digger at his most excitable age and stage and then hand him across to the GDA trainers when he comes of age. Digger was very vociferous and kept us all amused.

Staying on the fundraising trail, I received a lovely “thank-you” letter this week from the Children’s Society. Just before Christmas they helped us celebrate Christingles and in return we sent a number of candle money boxes home. In these boxes we asked you just to put in copper coins. Amazingly we raised £189. We also donated half of the money from the Carol Service to the same worthy cause. Thank you so much for your support and generosity.

Elsewhere, private schools received bad press this week with the headlines in the Times on Tuesday reading, “Elite schools have cavalier approach to child protection”. I can fully assure you that nothing could be further from the truth with us and with many others in the sector that I know well. Mr Stazicker, our Designated Safeguard Lead (DSL) spends a huge amount of time training every single member of our staff to be aware of their responsibilities and talking to all our children about their rights.

We also have a very close working relationship with the Dorset safeguarding team and have three other members of staff who also support this most essential part of school. They are Mrs Carr, Miss Clarke and Mrs Sewed.

Mrs Moss has launched details of her choir tour to Cornwall this week. It sounds an action packed few days at the end of Arts Week in June. It is an excellent reward for such a dedicated team and a chance for them all to display their talents to a wider audience and on a bigger stage.

The Chamber Choir have now exceeded forty pupils for the very first time and we have more boys involved than ever before. I am really pleased about this as it does wonders for the culture of your school when it becomes cool for boys to sing and dance. Much praise must be given to Khalid M and Joseph B in F7 who have really ploughed their own furrow and inspired younger boys to want to be like them.

We also have had an anti-bullying day in school this week with three mentors from the Diana Award, alongside Mrs Sewed and Mr Stazicker, training twenty of our own anti-bullying ambassadors from F5 to 7. Two others schools also joined us for the day. They were Twynham and Poole High. It was great for the children to mix with other schools and share their experiences on such an important issue. All participants received certificates of achievement. Harry A from F5 was singled out for specific praise due to his commitment and contribution to the day and with the excellent leadership skills he showed with his peers. I was delighted to present him with his award in this morning’s assembly.





The idea is that these ambassadors will be the energy that drives progress with the aim to eradicate all bullying in schools. They will train other children in school and their parents and staff too.

Not to be outdone on the stage, Mrs Fernley and her Form 7 charges have been rehearsing hard for many weeks for the first round of their Youth Speaks competition. We've had a dry run of them over the past few weeks and they have all sounded very accomplished. The winning team was made up of Imogen D, Dom W and Dylan W. They received individual "silver" salver plates and also one for the trophy cabinet at school and will go through to the next round which we think might coincide with our trip to see School of Rock in London. We'll do our best to see if we can find an alternative date.

Sadly I missed the first round because I am trying to keep a New Year's Resolution promise to Jo. That is that I will attend ballroom dancing lessons. Missing a week means you miss all the new moves. So far we have worked on the turning waltz and the cha-cha-cha. I'm not a natural but I'm doing my best and have promised the children (and staff) to give them a demo soon. Sadly the video camera will be broken that day! Mrs Sales is our real expert. She takes part in high level competitions and trains incredibly hard to be fit for her challenges. It might be something that we think of doing as a community at school as it's great fun and much harder than I thought. Watch this space!

On the same subject, Jo Sloley, mum of Nathan in F6 and Felix in F2, bravely challenged the staff to a game of hockey this week and wonders if there are any other like-minded parents who might rise to the challenge.
