

Children's and Young People's Survey

All Dorset Libraries and Community Managed Libraries will run the survey for two weeks from 12-24 February (one week during term time and one week during a half-term) in the library.

All children and young people up to 16 years of age will be asked to complete a simple questionnaire asking them about their use of the library and their satisfaction with core services.

Parents or carers of children aged 0 - 7 will be asked to complete the survey on behalf of their children.

Children aged 7 and over will be asked to complete their own survey.

Hello!

This week I thought we could speak about vegetables again, and why not one which is getting more popular **Squash**! In my view, although this veggie is getting a little bit more popular people are still unsure about it, either due to lack of knowledge and misconceptions or just because they haven't tried it before. But let me tell you, try it, you don't really know what you are missing. It's such a tasty veggie!!

The squashes belong to the cucurbits (cucurbitaceae) family and that includes cucumbers, squash, pumpkins, courgettes, watermelon, and melons. Pumpkin and butternut squash are two types of squash but there are four species of genus cucurbita.

Here in the UK we tend to see in the shops and use the butternut squash more but other countries like Portugal, Spain and Canada, the pumpkin is more popular.

The nutrition value of this vegetable is huge! Full of vitamins and antioxidants! It's a very good source of Fibre, Vitamin A, Vitamin C, Potassium and Manganese. It's very low in

saturated fat, cholesterol and sodium. So, you could almost say it's a fat-free natural product like the majority of the vegetables. It is also a good source of Vitamin E (Alpha Tocopherol), Thiamin, Niacin, Vitamin B6, Folate, Calcium, Iron and Magnesium. Therefore it's very beneficial to anybody with CVD like diabetes, heart conditions and high blood pressure and of course, to maintain your cholesterol levels at bay. And for our children it's a very good option because it has a sweet and nutty taste and also, will give them the calories they need from the carbohydrates it contains but with no extra fat.

The difference between the squash is really not massive but some species can have more vitamins and antioxidants than others.

So, for some of us who aren't really familiar with this veggie why not try a few recipes?
