Dear Parents

The prospect of the first snowflakes falling since the winter of 2013 sent an excited buzz around the school at the latter part of this week. Back to the chalk face, our first full week in school has gone very smoothly.

On Monday and Tuesday we welcomed two experienced ex-heads to give the health of the school an independent MOT test. (That's Ministry of Teaching).

As members of the IAPS we agree to have regular inspections to make sure we maintain the high standards and expectations of the Association. We were last inspected in June of 2014 and expect our next inspection to be in the autumn term of 2017 or the spring term of 2018. No advance notice is given of their visit. I get a phone call from a Reporting Inspector at 9am on the Monday morning and they arrive 24 hrs later. There are likely to be three inspectors with us for two very full days.

To make sure we are fully prepared the governors generously supported my request to invest in a mid-term visit so we could measure ourselves against the standards and regulations set, and have an independent review of the changes we have initiated in the last two years. They carried out a thorough audit of Health and Safety and checked our safe recruitment of staff. They read all the policies on our website and made suggestions of how we could improve best practice. They watched teachers teaching and children learning and scrutinised how we mark books. They chatted through governance and leadership with our Chair of Governors and met all our key leaders in school. They interviewed small groups of children and even sampled a school lunch.

From their visit we have а dozen recommendations to act upon that will help drive to keep improving. our on Reassuringly, if the real inspectors call today, we would be in very good shape though this won't stop our ambitions to be a better school. I've written this many times before but we're always looking to improve one hundred things by one per cent.

On this front, I hope you enjoyed receiving the new termly calendar? Mandy and I listened to your views on the new version we created for the autumn term and we have tweaked our new design for the spring term. You'll understand the "we" is the royal "we". It was StoneCoast and Mandy of course.

There is a new fold out added that has allowed us to change the font size and format and also add term dates. I hope you have noticed and that it works better?



On the sporting front the girls now have a term of netball to look forward to and the boys have the game of hockey in their sights. Kieran W will be the boys' sports captain and Teisha B will be the girls' sports captain. Harry Y will be our Head boy for the term and Merry P will be our Head Girl. I know they will all do a great job and be excellent role models.

Elsewhere in school, Vishnu in F3 has come out in sympathy with Mr Adams and is also hobbling around on crutches. Not far behind is Ms Thomasson who is hopping around after a hockey injury at the weekend and Dom W has a cast on his arm following a fall.
