#### Dear Parents

I hope all your children have enjoyed a happy return to school after their wellearned Easter break?

## Nutrition Natter

Hello!!



I hope you all had a fantastic time off with the family and enjoyed the spring weather in the UK. We were quite fortunate this year! Let's hope it will continue like this for summer....

On the topic of good weather and sunny days, although this week the temperature did go down too quickly and the sun is not as strong.... I thought I could speak about SUN Safety.

I would like to start reminding us all to stay in the shade from 11am to 3pm, which is the time the sun is stronger and therefore can harm our little ones delicate skins. Also, don't forget to use sunscreen cream, at least factor 30 for the children, hats, appropriate clothing and UV sunglasses.

The sun protection factor, or SPF, is a measure of the amount of ultraviolet B radiation (UVB) protection. SPFs are rated on a scale of 2 to 50+ based on the level of protection they offer, 50+ been the strongest for UVB protection. The star we see on the packing measures the amount of ultraviolet a radiation (UVA) protection. The star rating goes from one to five stars on UK sunscreens. You should always choose a higher star rating.

I finish this article with a few tips  $\heartsuit$ 

-- give greater attention to fair skin

-- consider the time of the day : avoid the sun in peak hours - 11am to 3pm

-- reapply sun protection products frequently and generously, even the long day lasting ones and waterproof

Enjoy spring and don't forget.... Protection to prevent sunburn and skin cancer in later life!
