We were able to spend some time in the low ropes area which was a nice treat. The children were so good at using the equipment to climb and balance.




Form 2

Whilst at Nothe they experienced a Monday wash day, a 1940's shop, and a school room with a very strict headmistress! The boys found it difficult to remember to take their caps off when entering a room, but the girls were lucky as their hats could stay on. The children also experienced an air raid when they had to run for cover into the Anderson Shelter and when the "All Clear" was sounded they had to use a stirrup pump to put out the fire!

Year 6 & 8 Girls' Stem Day



Last Friday, Mrs. Sewed and Mrs. Brunt took 10 girls from Year 6 and 8 and travelled to the Land Rover Bar, Ben Ainslie's America's cup hub. We took part in a series of STEM activities. STEM stands for Science. Technology, Engineering and Maths. Βv 2024, Britain will be 2000 people short in STEM based jobs. This day was aimed to encourage students to do STEM jobs and break the gender stereotypes associated with them.




Once we got there, we were taken to a room full of robots, VR headsets and lots of other activities. I particularly enjoyed the liquid nitrogen ice cream! A company called Glam Sci had a showcase explaining that there are many different and fun jobs available in Science. Portsmouth University held a showcase involving 3D printers and robots; showing how they can be used.



Then, we were challenged to create a sail or wing with the lowest drag possible. We put them in the wind tunnel and tested them. With a lot of perseverance, Erin's team managed to get a third of the drag compared to the lift!

We also had the opportunity to speak to a variety of different engineers and inspirational speakers to learn more about the wide range of roles based around STEM careers and the variety of ways to apply for them. It was incredibly interesting to find out why they chose the subject. Many were heading for very different careers before finding Engineering.

A professor called gave us a talk on finding the area of STEM that suites our personality types and interests. We did several activities and were advised on different attributes and career choices open to us. I found this particularly interesting.



Towards the end of our trip. A gentleman came in with a mini mars rover. He talked to us about the European Space Centres latest project on building Exo Mars, the latest Mars Rover. He had built and programmed the Rover himself and explained the problems he encountered as well as the solutions he found. Unfortunately, this mini mars rover won't be leaving this planet any time soon! Overall, we had a brilliant and interesting day that opened our eyes to more career opportunities available.
