Dear Parents


Welcome to a Broadway Hermes.

As you will know, we are right in the middle of Joseph performances and this morning is our only opportunity to keep our "463 not out" innings going.


Today's Hermes might be somewhat briefer than normal weeks, when I usually have the chance to reflect at leisure late on a Thursday evening.

During Creative Arts week, we have enjoyed some 'splatter painting' using spray bottles. Our big pictures looked really effective!




Fledglings & Nursery

ALUMNI Update

Guy Madgwick



I think fondly of my time at Sunninghill with Miss Norton and Miss Murray (though I was certainly not a favourite of the latter!). I went on to Hardyes School in 1971, graduated with a Geology degree from Oxford Brookes in 1982, Worked as a petroleum geologist in the North Sea and Middle East for Amoco before joining the power industry in 1990 after gaining an MSc from Loughborough University. I undertook an MBA at Warwick and have worked in Renewable Energy for the last 15 years very successfully having been the Managing Director of 3 companies.

Jane Madgwick BSc MSc

(BSc Ecology 2:1 at York University, MSc Conservation at University College London)



Since 2004, Jane has been CEO of Wetlands International, leading a network of 20 offices operating in over 100 countries. The main focus of the organisation is in the developing world -on rivers and lakes, peatlands, deltas and coasts. Wetlands International builds knowledge and facilitates action to safeguard and restore wetlands for biodiversity conservation, security, disaster risk reduction, water climate resilience and livelihoods. Βv working with governments, companies, knowledge institutes and civil society organisations. Wetlands International brokers knowledge and leverages change at a landscape scale. Jane is prominent in building partnerships and global dialogues that enable ecosystem-based solutions, contributing to achieve a safe and secure world. Jane was a Member of the Clinton Global Initiative and special advisor on Environmental Stewardship, since 2012, receiving two "awards of excellence" from President Clinton for Wetlands International's contributions tackling to environmental and climate challenges.

Previously Jane worked for WWF in Europe and Australia and for the Broads Authority, UK. Here some further info of work before Wetlands International:

I was Director of Conservation for the Broads National Park, UK (1989-1999), responsible for establishing the necessary research, policies and practices to resolve conflicts between agriculture, tourism and conservation in this complex and fragile wetland system.

As the first Director of the WWF European, Middle East and North Africa Freshwater Programme (1999-2001) I designed and set in motion a pan-European initiative that enabled staff working in over 20 countries.

As Regional Director, WWF Australia (2001-2004), I established the national freshwater programme and developed and managed a staff team and four major ecoregional initiatives dealing with terrestrial, marine and freshwater conservation priorities in West Australia, from scratch.


I led an Anglo-Somali expedition "Somalia Research Project" to document the value of forests of southern Somalia's Jubba river in 1986 and participated in ecological research expeditions in North Yemen, Belize and Australia prior to that.
