Dear Parents

The Class Reps who didn't rush out from school immediately were involved in a fire drill rehearsal that they seemed to enjoy. I think they were amazed at how quickly and quietly we managed to assembly and account for every child. In all it took over three minutes.



The PTFA do some amazing work for the school on a range of scales. This week the Reception and Form 1 classes received a present from them. Through the post came a butterfly kit complete with caterpillars. The children will be able to follow the full lifecycle of the butterfly in real time. As a passionate science teacher, it is process I continue to find absolutely fascinating. I will keep you up to date on their metamorphosis.

In February 2019 my Gran and I took part in an Aquafit class in Dorchester 1610 organised by the Dorchester Lions to raise money to buy a local defibrillator.

Through the event I learned that that there is no national database of defibrillator locations and the Lions buy from the South West Ambulance service because they look after the machine; they service it annually to make sure it is working correctly, and they also replace the pads if the defibrillator is used.

More than 3,600 people used a defibrillator in the South West in 2018 and for every minute that passes once in cardiac arrest, a person loses a further 10% chance of survival, and with this dramatic loss in chance of survival, there is a need of a defibrillator every 4-5 minutes walk.

Idea to fundraise for a school defibrillator

This gave me the idea to raise money to get a defibrillator fitted to the school hall. I have a few fundraising plans in place, and it all kicks off with a raffle and with permission a non-uniform sports themed day.

Who will be able to use the defibrillator?

Anyone can suffer a heart attack although it does tend to be needed more by older people. This could be the teachers or people visiting the school which includes family members attending school events and all the members of the local community that use the hall on a weekly basis.

By placing the defibrillator on the hall way people who live close to the school can also use the machine so it will be a good community resource.

Millfield Sailing Regatta



With strong winds predicted one school pulled out at the last minute expecting no racing to go ahead. However, the race team put out a short reaching course with tacks and no gybes to keep as many boats upright as possible. Checking the weather instruments afterwards we discovered they were on the water with maximum gusts of 34 knots or Force 8 in old money.



The Olympic boats, in town for the Europeans, were not sailing because it was too windy! The fleet of twenty boats was split into four flights, with each flight launching and racing three times with the races timed. With a maximum of two laps per race the races were short and exciting with mistakes punished as there was no time to catch up. Erin and Gabriel got off to a great start with a win in the first race. Hitting the committee boat cost them dearly in race two with a third place followed by a win in the last after the perfect start. Overall they finished third, only beaten by sailors from the GB squad!

Valentine and Freddie had an excellent series with a 1, 2, 2 in their three races but with slower times. Overall, they finished eighth with Freddie, the youngest crew in the fleet.

Thomas and Sam sailed consistently and with a 2, 2, 3 in their races sailed to an overall tenth and the only Year Five team in the fleet. However, they had one first place as the only boat in the flight to sail the correct course. They finished sixteenth overall.
