I will write to our local MP to see if he can help, though I imagine he is fairly busy at the moment looking for his "whip" and working out how life as an independent MP works.

Talking of politicians, did you follow the outcome of the Labour party conference in Brighton this week?

In case it passed you by, they voted to abolish independent schools and to use these assets

to boost state education in what can only be described as a "land grab".

As you might imagine, it has caused a rather big stir!

The "least worst" scenario if Labour were to be elected is that VAT at 20% will added to your school fees. It is also likely that our charitable status would be withdrawn meaning that we have a bigger fiscal responsibility in terms of corporation tax and business rates.

I absolutely understand and totally agree that every child has the right to an outstanding education. Alongside justice and freedom of speech, it is one of the bedrocks of any developed nation, but surely the solution has to be that every local school has to have significant investment to help reduce class size and give teachers the resources they need. In some of the very best educational systems around the world teaching is a highly paid job that ranks alongside doctors and solicitors in terms of status and salary.

There are currently 2500 independent schools in the UK educating 600, 000 children, many of whom come from around the world because we are market leaders. It is a thriving business that generates many billions of pounds for the Treasury. We are collectively one of the UK's biggest and most successful employers.

Imagine the impact of our pupils going back into already oversubscribed and stretched local schools.

On Tuesday evening we had our first parents' evening of the year. Our usual venue of the Drawing and Dining Room was rendered out of action by leaks coming through where the lead had been stolen!

Incidentally, and back to my moan of local services being over stretched, the theft of  $\pounds 25,000$  of lead warrants a crime reference number and then a conversation with your insurer but not a visit by the Police who are also completely over-stretched.

Anyway, moving on quickly before I get completely bogged-down, we relocated the Parents" Evening to the classrooms of the first floor. We seem to have stumbled on a rather good idea as feedback from Form 5 parents suggested it may have offered more privacy with improved acoustics.

All is well with the Form 5 children who have made the transition into Senior Prep with great ease.

We will try the same system for Form 6 parents next Tuesday.

One of my long held dreams for the school looks like it will finally come to fruition this year. Jo Telfer's arrival as Science and Games teacher has rekindled our desire to get an equestrian team competing in the school's name. Watch this space!

On the avian front we are still awaiting the first egg from our hens. Liz has enriched their welfare this week. They have been allowed out of their run and into the hallowed ground of her garden. They scratched around for a few hours, de-bugging various areas. They then all stood to attention whilst she picked them up and put them back into their run – she's a hen whisperer!



Finally, Form 7 parents joined us for their class assembly this morning. The class took us through the thrills and spills of their trip to France last week. They certainly seem to have had the most brilliant time and have come back thoroughly enriched.
