Dear Sir/Madam,

Dorchester & District Angling Society (DDAS) have a Junior section that is now going into it's third year and our aim is to get young people interested in the sport of Coarse Fishing.

WHO WE ARE?

DDAS is an angling club with a history of more than 70 years and well over 500 members.

WHO AM I?

My name is Graham Howard and I am the Junior Secretary for DDAS. I have a Level 2 qualification as an angling coach. I started fishing with my dad at 4 years old and 46 years later, my passion for angling is still growing. My angling experience covers match fishing at the highest levels and working within the Carp fishing industry. I coached my local club juniors to a top ten finish in the Junior National in 1990 and I hope to introduce new anglers to a sport that has given me so much joy and fulfilment over the years.

WHAT DO WE DO?

DDAS Juniors has a mission show the younger generations that there more to life than social media, computer games and television. Fishing gets you closer to nature, helps you to see animals you otherwise would not know where even there and to teach participants responsibility to look after creatures in their care and the environment in which they live.

WHAT HAPPENS AT THE EVENTS, WHEN AND WHERE ARE THEY HELD?

The events are held on club affiliated venues like Harbourbridge Lakes in Chickerell and Revels Fishery near Buckland Newton. Events in the past have been held after school in the mid week but, providing we can supply an appropriate number of volunteer helpers, we can hold the events to suit the requirements of the school. As far as possible we like to coach participants on a one to one basis depending on numbers attending and volunteers available. Group numbers of up to 12 participants work best.

There will be a brief introduction and a chat about health and safety, then it's on with the fishing. Sessions will typically be around two to three hours long, but we can taylor the sessions to meet the requirements of the school. Requirements can be agreed when the booking is made.

WHO IS IT FOR?

Boys and Girls from 6 to 17 y/o. All are welcome.



Fishing has been for many years a predominantly male activity. I am out to change that! I am personally a strong supporter of women's sports, particularly one that has been seen to be 'Male Owned' for many years. I am delighted to say that we have a couple of young ladies that regularly attend the DDAS Junior events, but I want more and won't be satisfied until I do.
