A very appreciative audience, growing in size week by week, enjoyed performances from those making their first steps towards ABRSM grade 1 to those who were quickly becoming consummate experts.

Form 8 Flying Start

In the past 5 weeks the pupils have spent countless hours planning, designing and constructing model gliders to compete in a gliding competition called Flying Start. Flying Start is aimed to increase the creativity of students and to show them what an engineering career would look like. It also gave us a chance to practise our STEM skills.

When we arrived, after a quick briefing, we were split into 2 groups, one started by presenting their posters which showed how the process went for us and the other group took a 20 minute quiz on knowledge of flight concepts. We as a class succeeded in both.



When both teams had completed both activities we were taken to do an engineering challenge called lunar landing; the activity consisted of creating a parachute out of

limited material such as paper cups, string and tissue paper to see how well they would cope when dropped from various heights with ping pong balls inside to represent a human being.

In the afternoon, we were taken to a gigantic aircraft hangar which had a Merlin helicopter which is able to carry 30 people. We then had three attempts to fly our gliders however we fell short to some of the other teams. One of the teams got the award for 'best crash' as their glider broke and they resulted to throwing it like a tomahawk on their last attempt.

Overall the experience was very enjoyable and has inspired many of us to think more about a future in engineering. We feel we have benefited from this event and have gained lots of knowledge in this area.

Busy gardeners on a beautiful sunny afternoon.


We managed to make direct sowings of peas and parsnips in to the raised beds. It was lovely to finally get on to the garden.


